Getting the Coronavirus vaccine


A visual story explaining what happens when I'm invited to get the Coronavirus vaccine.





Coronavirus is a disease that has spread around the world. It has made some people very unwell.

Scientists have recently created a vaccine for the Coronavirus. This helps the body to fight the virus.



A vaccine is a type of medicine that protects you from catching an illness. There are less diseases around the world because of vaccines.

If I'm over 16, I will be invited to get the Coronavirus vaccine this year.




When it is time for me to have my vaccine, I will get a call, text, letter or email from the NHS inviting me.

But I do not have to get the vaccine if I decide I do not want it.



I can book my appointment online and my invite will tell me how to do this.




I will not have to pay for my vaccine.

If I have any serious allergies, I should check with my doctor whether it is safe for me to get the vaccine.



I can get my vaccine in a number of places like a pharmacy, GP surgery or a centre.

I will think about where is best for me. For example, at a bigger venue I may have to wait longer for my appointment as there will be more people waiting.



If I'm worried about my vaccine I may want to book an appointment at the start or the end of the day.

On the day of my appointment I will arrive at my given time.



I can bring my health passport with me to help express my individual needs to the person giving me my vaccine.



When I am ready for my vaccine, I will need to sit down and roll up my sleeve.

The vaccine will be given through a small injection in my arm. I may feel a small prick but it will not hurt.




I can ask the person giving my vaccine if I can see the equipment first. This might make me feel more relaxed.

I will try and sit very still when I am ready for my injection. I can listen to music or look away if I am feeling scared.



After I have had the injection, I will need to wait for 15 minutes. This is so the person giving my vaccine can make sure that I'm well enough to travel home.

I will need two injections of the vaccine over the course of 12 weeks for lasting protection.



When I've had the first injection, I will be told where and when to go for my second injection.



I will be given a record card with my next appointment written on it. This will be in three to 12 weeks time.

I'll keep my card safe and make sure I go to my second appointment to get my second injection.



I may feel some side effects when I have the vaccine, these are nothing to worry about.



My arm may feel heavy or sore where I had the injection.



I may feel achy or like I've got the flu.



I could feel tired or have a headache.



It can take a few weeks for the vaccine to protect me so it's important that I continue to social distance and wear my mask.

Having the vaccine makes me less likely to get very ill from Coronavirus.
